

Many Ways of Peace will show the film “Wisconsin’s Mining Standoff” on Thursday, September 25, at 7PM. This half-hour documentary film originally aired as part of Al Jazeera America’s award winning investigative documentary series “Fault Lines” and is currently touring the state. Discussion will follow the screening.

Produced and directed by Milwaukee-based 371 Productions, the film takes viewers to Ashland and Iron Counties, where the company Gogebic Taconite or “GTAC” (a subsidiary of “Cline Resource and Development” of Florida) has set off a battle over the state’s natural resources by proposing to dig what could be one North America’s largest open pit mines in Wisconsin’s Penokee Hills. The film explores the potential impacts of the mine and how legislation changed the state’s mining laws. The filmmakers visited Ashland and Iron Counties to gather stories of the people there and the company behind the mine. Company executives are interviewed, as are area residents in opposition to the mine.
